**Censorship and Conflict in Seventeenth-Century England** Nov 21 2021 Censorship profoundly affected early modern writing. *Censorship and Conflict in Seventeenth-Century England* offers a detailed picture of early modern censorship and investigates the pressures that censorship exerted on seventeenth-century authors, printers, and publishers. Among the issues that Robertson addresses in this book are the workings of the licensing machinery, the designs of art and obliquity under a regime of censorship, and the involutions of authorship attendant on anonymity.
