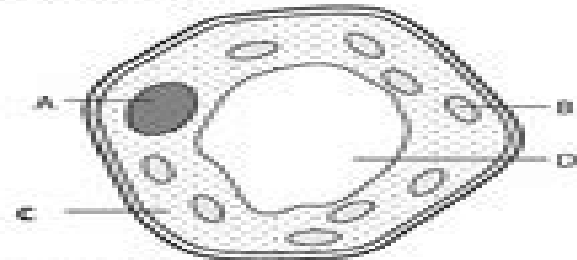


1. The diagram below shows a plant cell.
