Notes on the Synthesis of Form Christopher Alexander, 1964 These notes are about the process of design the process of inventing things which display new physical order organization form in response to function This book opening with these words presents an entirely new theory of the process of design In the first part of the book Christopher Alexander discusses the process by which a form is adapted to the context of human needs and demands that has called it into being He shows that such an adaptive process will be successful only if it proceeds piecemeal instead of all at once It is for this reason that forms from traditional unself-conscious cultures molded not by designers but by the slow pattern of changes within tradition are so beautifully organized and adapted When the designer in our own self-conscious culture is called on to create a form that is adapted to its context he is unsuccessful because the preconceived categories out of which he builds his picture of the problem do not correspond to the inherent components of the problem and therefore lead only to the arbitrariness willfulness and lack of understanding which plague the design of modern buildings and modern cities In the second part Mr Alexander presents a method by which the designer may bring his full creative imagination into play and yet avoid the traps of irrelevant preconception He shows that whenever a problem is stated it is possible to ignore existing concepts and to create new concepts out of the structure of the problem itself which do correspond correctly to what he calls the subsystems of the adaptive process By treating each of these subsystems as a separate subproblem the designer can translate the new concepts into form The form because of the process will be well adapted to its context non-arbitrary and correct The mathematics underlying this method based mainly on set theory is fully developed in a long appendix Another appendix demonstrates the application of the method to the design of an Indian village
