Orwell's *Diary of Events Leading Up to the War* (2 July - 1 September 1939); his *Domestic Diary* (9 August 1938 - 29 April 1940), which records in detail his attempts at running a smallholding; his abstracts from *Daily Worker* and *News Chronicle* reports on the Spanish Civil War; and his *Marrakech Notebook* with illustrations are reproduced. Many letters not previously published are included, and there is a large number of reviews. This volume also includes a sequence of letters that throws a completely new light on Orwell's personal relationships.
