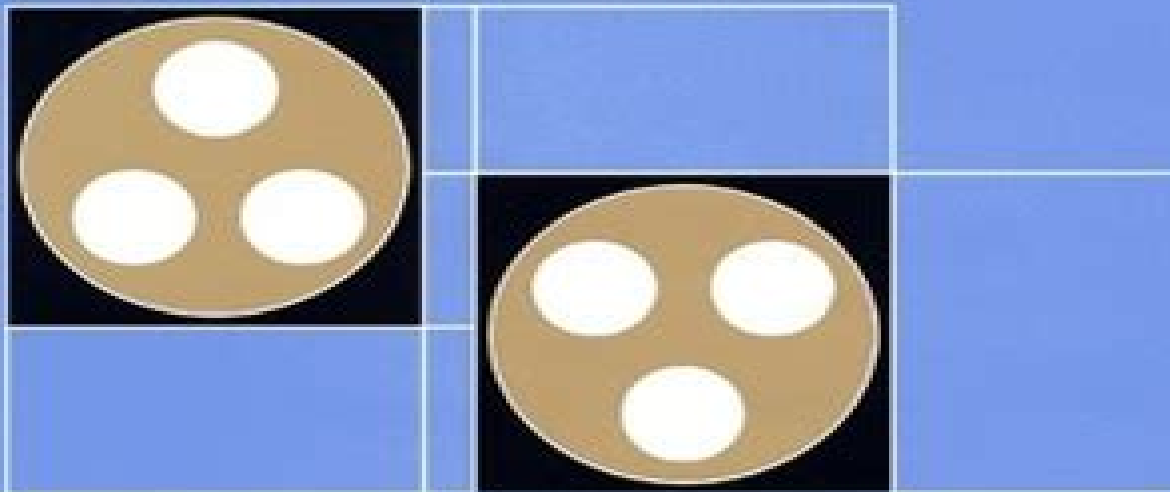

A Logical Journey Hao Wang, 1997-02-03 Hao Wang 1921 1995 was one of the few confidants of the great mathematician and logician Kurt Gödel *A Logical Journey* is a continuation of Wang's *Reflections on Gödel* and also elaborates on discussions contained in *From Mathematics to Philosophy* A decade in preparation it contains important and unfamiliar insights into Gödel's views on a wide range of issues from Platonism and the nature of logic to minds and machines the existence of God and positivism and phenomenology The impact of Gödel's theorem on twentieth century thought is on par with that of Einstein's

theory of relativity Heisenberg's uncertainty principle or Keynesian economics These previously unpublished intimate and informal conversations however bring to light and amplify Gödel's other major contributions to logic and philosophy They reveal that there is much more in Gödel's philosophy of mathematics than is commonly believed and more in his philosophy than his philosophy of mathematics Wang writes that it is even possible that his quite informal and loosely structured conversations with me which I am freely using in this book will turn out to be the fullest existing expression of the diverse components of his inadequately articulated general philosophy The first two chapters are devoted to Gödel's life and mental development In the chapters that follow Wang illustrates the quest for overarching solutions and grand unifications of knowledge and action in Gödel's written speculations on God and an afterlife He gives the background and a chronological summary of the conversations considers Gödel's comments on philosophies and philosophers his support of Husserl's phenomenology and his digressions on Kant and Wittgenstein and his attempt to demonstrate the superiority of the mind's power over brains and machines Three chapters are tied together by what Wang perceives to be Gödel's governing ideal of philosophy an exact theory in which mathematics and Newtonian physics serve as a model for philosophy or metaphysics Finally in an epilog Wang sketches his own approach to philosophy in contrast to his interpretation of Gödel's outlook

explain the technical ideas that are taken for granted in much contemporary philosophical writing. Notions like denumerability, modal scope distinction, Bayesian conditionalization, and logical completeness are usually only elucidated deep within difficult specialist texts. By offering simple explanations that bypass much irrelevant and boring detail, *Philosophical Devices* is able to cover a wealth of material that is normally only available to specialists. The book contains four sections, each of three chapters. The first section is about sets and numbers, starting with the membership relation and ending with the generalized continuum hypothesis. The second is about analyticity, a-priority, and necessity. The third is about probability, outlining the difference between objective and subjective probability and exploring aspects of conditionalization and correlation. The fourth deals with metalogic, focusing on the contrast between syntax and semantics and finishing with a sketch of Gödel's theorem. *Philosophical Devices* will be useful for university students who have got past the foothills of philosophy and are starting to read more widely, but it does not assume any prior expertise. All the issues discussed are intrinsically interesting and often downright fascinating. It can be read with pleasure and profit by anybody who is curious about the technical infrastructure of contemporary philosophy.

Non-standard models of arithmetic are of interest to mathematicians through the presence of infinite integers and the various properties they inherit from the finite integers. Since their introduction in the 1930s, they have come to play an important role in model theory and in combinatorics through independence results such as the Paris-Harrington theorem. This book is an introduction to these developments and stresses the interplay between the first-order theory, recursion-theoretic aspects, and the structural properties of these models. Prerequisites for an understanding of the text have been kept to a minimum, these being a basic grounding in elementary model theory and a familiarity with the notions of recursive, primitive recursive, and recursive sets. Consequently, the book is suitable for postgraduate students coming to the subject for the first time, and a number of exercises of varying degrees of difficulty will help to further the reader's understanding.
