More than fifty years later, he mentioned in a letter to his son Michael that this trip had deeply affected him. Bilbo's journey in *The Hobbit* from Rivendell to the other side of the Misty Mountains, he said, was based on his own adventures in 1911. Tolkien himself named a few specific sources of inspiration, most explicitly the Silberhorn (Silverhorn). So I wondered: Was this perhaps only the tip of the iceberg?
