It begins with a general introduction to the symphony and various musical styles and then describes, chronologically, over seven hundred pieces--from Vivaldi to twentieth-century composers. Mordden also includes a glossary of musical terms and other useful aids for the music lover. The Austrian writer Stefan Zweig (1881-1942) built up a large collection of autograph manuscripts. And those who are just starting to explore the rich world of classical music will soon discover that Phillips is a guide they can trust.

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
