To add to her stress, she is not the only fledgling at the *House of Night* with special powers: when she discovers that the leader of the *Dark Daughters*, the school's most elite group, is misusing her Goddess-given gifts, Zoey must look deep within herself for the courage to embrace her destiny—with a little help from her new vampire friends. These eight stories are linked by a date and a motif. All of them have to do with love. Love and its conditions on the night of March 19, 1929. But nothing is as it seems in this accomplished, suspenseful novel. Glyver's employer Tredgold warns him to trust no one: Is his enigmatic neighbour Fordyce Jukes spying on him? Is the brutal murderer Josiah Pluckthorn on his trail? And is Glyver himself, driven half-mad by the desire for revenge, telling us the whole truth in his candid, but very artful, "confession"?
